SVD Brothers Celebrates Brothers Day

SVD Brothers celebrated Brothers Day in St. Martin Secondary School (SMART) at Adoagyiri, Nsawam on 16th June 2010. This celebration was a response of the resolution of the SVD Assembly of Brothers held in the Philippines last year. There were two main sessions in the program. The first was the talk on SVD Brothers in Ghana and its connection to SMART; and the second was the celebration of the Holy Eucharist with special focus on religious and missionary vocation. The first session began at 9:00 am. Rev. Bro. Pius Agyemang was the main speaker of the session. Apart from 8 SVD Brothers and 6 SVD Priests in attendance there were more than 900 students participated in the symposium. In his talk, Bro. Pius shared that, the school – SMART was started because the SVD wanted that its Brother candidates should have an additional Secondary Education apart from their Form 4 Certificates which they were already having. The school was very small in the beginning. According to Br. Pius, among the last group of 21 Brothers he was the only one who survived in this special journey to Religious Brotherhood. He said that he did not regret to have continued to be an SVD Brother. And he is happy to remain an SVD Brother forever. Though few Brothers were coming to the school, nonetheless many students were enrolling. So with this small beginning it grew bigger and bigger until it arrived to this present profile: SMART having more than 1000 male and female students; SMART having more teachers and SMART having more facilities. He concluded by challenging the students to pray and discern for a religious vocation; to join the Society and to promote the Brothers' Vocation in the SVD because the SVD gave birth to St. Martin's Secondary School. After the talk questions like: who is an SVD Brother? do they marry? how can one join and so forth? were spontaneously asked and a vocation club was formed. The second part which was the celebration of the Holy Eucharist began at 4:00pm. The main celebrant Rev. Fr. John Acheampong, SVD who was also the Head Master of the school encouraged all, specially, the students to do their tasks very well. He commented that to study well, to pray well, and to do their "work and happiness" very well can be signs of a vocation to religious life. He supported this by sharing the story of his own vocation to the SVD that he was diligent in his work and studies; the witnesses of the SVD founding generation especially St. Arnold Janssen and St. Joseph Freinademetz were exemplary. He remarked, we did not play with our studies and works. He also added this encouraging and challenging thought by mentioning the lives of St. Francis of Assisi and St. John Bosco among others. Together with Fr. Andrew Quaye-Foli, SVD he concluded by singing a vocation song.

Arnoldus Family Makes an Annual Retreat



Members of the Arnoldus Family: SVD and SSpS in Ghana Province made their annual retreat in Divine Word Catholic Conference Center (DWCCC) at Adoagyiri Nsawam on 20th -26th June (First Batch); 27th June – 3rd July (Second Batch) and 4th – 11th July (Third batch).

As retreat guide, Fr. Michael Somers, SVD accompanied the retreatants into a deep spiritual journey to meet God in light of the Divine Word – Jesus Christ which sparkles in the witness of life of the SVD, SSpS and SSpSAP founding generation: St. Arnold Janssen; St. Joseph Freinademetz; Blessed Helena; Blessed Josefa; and 4 SVD Martyrs – Blessed Louis Mzyk, Blessed Gregory Frackowiak, Blessed Aloysius Liguda and Blessed Stanislaus

Kubista.

Certainly, he remarked, they can lead us to God because they were **men and women of prayer**: *“When we offer up most of our prayer for others and only think of ourselves last, not out of pride but out of love for God and neighbor; our good God will hear our prayers for ourselves just as well as if we had prayed twice or three times as much for our own wishes.”* - St. Arnold. *“Prayer is for the Catholic Mission what is rain for the fields”* – St. Joseph. *“I have prayed earnestly for the light of the Holy Spirit that God may lead me according*

to the plan he has had for me from all eternity - Blessed Josefa. **Men and women of God:** “God’s will is eminently precious; it is the fount of all happiness. Our good God means so well with us. If only we would always faithfully fulfill his holy will and pay attention to the promptings of the Holy Spirit.” - St. Arnold “Let us remain unafraid in all dangers, trusting calmly in the divine Providence that catches over us day and night,” - St. Joseph. “God alone can fill your heart. The human heart is far too great to be held captive by creatures.”- Blessed Maria Helena. “I desire nothing more than with the grace of God to be the least and to sacrifice myself for the work of evangelization.” – Blessed Josefa. **Men and women of mission:** “The Lord challenges our faith to do something new, precisely when so many things are collapsing in the Church.” – St. Arnold. “To be missionary is the finest task in the world”– St. Joseph. “I am prepared to dedicate myself to serving the apostolate with all my love and all my life..” – Blessed Helena. “I desire nothing more than, with the grace of God, to be the least and to offer myself as a sacrifice for the work of spreading the Faith.” – Blessed Josefa.

He synthesized that the Arnoldus Family spirituality, as reflected in the life of the founding generation, is a journey of life. This journey is a journey of a dynamic relationship within oneself, with others and all of creation and with God in one’s conversion, compassion and contemplation. In this call to life-giving relationships the mission is to participate in God’s mission of proclaiming the Kingdom of God. With a discerning spirit being abreast with the signs of the times, the members of Arnoldus Family proclaim the Kingdom of God with emphasis on its inclusiveness, which means that, no one and nobody is excluded. Therefore, they are mindful not of conformity but of their openness to diversity. And this would spontaneously flow in the spirit of their fourfold prophetic dialogues: 1) with faith seekers and with people who have no faith community (SVD) - relationship with the un-evangelized (SSpS); 2) with the poor and marginalized (SVD/SSpS); 3) with different people of cultures (SVD/SSpS) and 4) with different religious traditions and secular ideologies (SVD/SSpS). Marked by their fourfold characteristic dimensions (SVD/SSpS): 1) Biblical ministry (SVD) – Truth (SSpS); 2) mission animation (SVD) – community formation (SSpS); 3) Justice and peace and integrity of creation (SVD/SSpS) and 4) Communication (SVD) – with preferential option for women (SSpS).

In attendance, there were 15 SSpS and 11 SVDs in the first batch; 2 SSpS and 36 SVDs in the second batch, and 25 SSpS and 5 SVDs in the third batch.

May the Holy Triune God live in our hearts and in the hearts of all people.

Accra District:

New Aplaku

Saints Peter and Paul Catholic Church of New Aplaku is 10 years Old.



A decade of existence with constant growth in numerical strength, physical structures and in the life in the Spirit of its members is more than wonderful.

The celebration of the 10th anniversary of Sts. Peter and Paul was a week-long affair. It started with a “Youth Day” on 27th June 2010. This was followed by the celebration of the Feast of Sts. Peter and Paul itself on 29th June. And then there was spiritual retreat from 30th June – 2nd July led by Fr. James Owusu. After that, general “work and happiness”-cleaning up on the 3rd July. Then finally, the climax of the celebration was celebrated on 4th July. On the

climax day, the archbishop of the Metropolitan Archdiocese of Accra, most Rev. Charles Palmer Buckle graced the occasion with Episcopal Mass. Fr. John Straathof, SVD, the parochial administrator, and Fr. Robert Yinamyah, SVD, assistant priest, concelebrated with him. “A decade of God’s Grace, Mercies and Blessings” in following the life of Sts Peter and Paul the Apostles was the theme. Peter the Apostle to the Jews on whom the Lord builds his church; Paul the Apostle to the Gentiles, in whom the Lord gave the mandate of proclaiming the Good News to the whole world were indeed two great pillars of the Church worthy to be venerated. Before confirming 47 (15 boys and 32 girls) confirmandi, His Grace Bishop Charles proclaimed his final catechesis to them. He highlighted the importance of: 1) prayer, 2) fasting, 3) good works, 4) Word of God, and 5) Holy Eucharist. He said that as confirmed Christians we are missionaries of Christ. Following therefore the example of Christ, Christians are men and women who pray; find time for fasting; do corporal and spiritual works of mercy; have deep love of the Word of God; and receive often the Holy Eucharist. There was also a thanksgiving collection on that day. Sunday born turned out to be the winner. According to some members, it happened so because Fr. John Straathof was born of Sunday. The new school building (uncompleted) was dedicated after the Mass. The reception and socializing recapped the whole celebration.

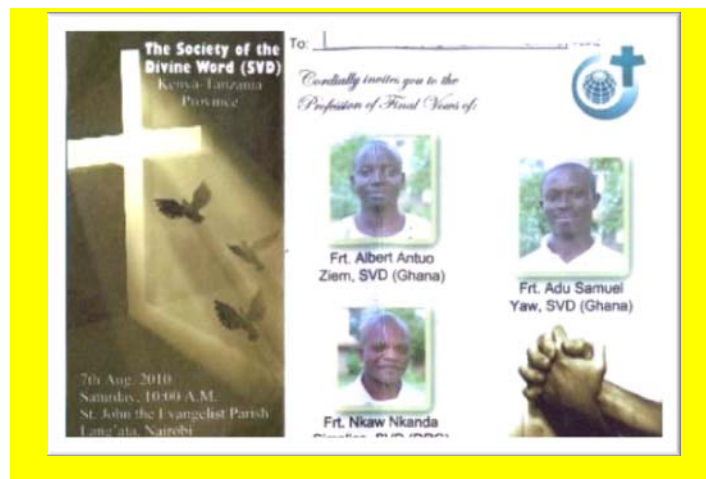

SVD SSpS Combined Tertiate Renewal Program 2011

A Journey of Renewal!

This is the IV SVD-SSpS International Combined Tertiate Program for three months. The first two Combine Program were in English (2000; 2003) and the latest was in Spanish (2006). Based on the enriching experiences and strong recommendations of the participants of the past combined programs both SVD and SSpS General Councils have agreed to offer once again to the members of both Congregations.

I. Thrust:

The primary thrust of the program is to foster personal renewal of one's IDENTITY as a religious missionary SVD or SSPS, called to be a witness and to be at the service of the mission of Jesus – the Reign of God in the present context of our world. It is not meant primarily to be an updating course neither on theology nor of pastoral in general. The stress is on RENEWAL of one's religious missionary consecrated life.

Hence the program is organized to facilitate personal renewal and communal process by means of biblical-theological input, reflection and prayer, liturgical celebrations in an international, intercultural and inter-gender living together as a community. A genuine renewal demands personal active participation and commitment to the overall process and the goals of the program.

The participants are of various nationalities and cultures, from different missionary pastoral backgrounds and experiences. This is in itself a source of enrichment for all, which requires an open mindedness and willingness to learn, to appreciate the differences, to share one's own experiences and to dialogue in order to foster the spirit of unity in diversity.

II. The 2011 Combined Tertiate Renewal Program

The Program is from 23 March to 16 June, 2011. It starts in Steyl, the Netherlands, then Brixen-Ojes and ends in Nemi, in Italy.

1. The Steyl-Ojes Part – A three week program of getting in touch with the historical and spiritual roots our religious missionary Spirituality in Steyl, the Netherlands. It is getting to know more about the beginnings of our religious missionary family of three Congregations founded by St. Arnold Janssen together with the Co-Foundresses Bl. Maria Helena Virgo, Bl. Josefa Hendrina and Mother Mary Michaela.

From Steyl a four day pilgrimage to the homeland of St. Joseph Freinademetz in Northern Italy, South Tirol. He was a Diocesan priest who embraced a missionary life to a far country in China and remained there until he died. In his canonization P. John Paul II declared him as "*a model of evangelical inculturation*" for the universal church.

2. The Nemi Part – The major section of the renewal program will be in Nemi, in the Province of Rome, Italy. Nemi is situated in the Albano Hills outside of the city of Rome. It is a quiet place, around 600 meters above sea level, surrounded by the beauty of nature and enveloped by clear pure air – just appropriate for personal rest, reflection and prayer. The main building is just interiorly renovated which offer suitable facilities for such a renewal program. Different invited resource persons come to give their input reflection be scriptural or theological or pastoral or psychological or spiritual to facilitate the inner process of renewal.

III. Contents of the Program

1. Some themes of reflection to foster an ongoing renewal:

- *Process of becoming a faith-life community*
- *Rediscovering the Founding Generation – foundational charism*
- *Roots and basic elements of our missionary Spirituality*
- *Spiritual awareness and spiritual direction*
- *Intercultural living and witnessing*
- *Vowed Identity*
- *Life Transitions*
- *Journey into inner Self*
- *Kingdom of God*
- *Old Testament*

- *Jesus and the gospels*
- *Inter-Gentes Mission in Post Modern Setting*
- *Gender Consciousness*
- *Prophetic Dialogue in Praxis*
- *Mission Today and Characteristic Dimensions*

2. Personal Renewal Project during the program.
3. Intercultural, interracial and inter-gender community living.
4. Spiritual direction.
5. Personal days for integration, prayer, reading and reflection.
6. Sharing of Mission experiences by the participants
7. Visits to Centers of Displaced People and Refugees in Rome
8. Pilgrimages to Goch, Ojes, Rome, Assisi, Catacombs,

IV. Personalized Guided Retreat in silence and in prayer.

The whole renewal is a time of personal spiritual journey, yet there is a privileged moment of being with oneself in the presence of the Triune God in prayer and in silence. Each one is accompanied daily by a Retreat Guide during the retreat.

Requisites for a meaningful participation SVD-SSpS international renewal program 2011

I. Basic conditions for a full participation in the program:

1. Physically and psychologically in good conditions.
2. Clear intention and desire to renew oneself for the missionary service.
3. Openness to an international, multicultural and inter-gender living as a community of disciples, consecrated women and men.
4. Readiness to participate in all the sessions and activities.
5. Openness to share one's life, faith and mission pastoral experiences.
6. Willingness to make the personalized guided retreat in silence and in prayer.
7. Desire to grow spiritually with the help of a spiritual direction during the program.
8. Openness to creative liturgy and prayers celebrating our faith and our life.

Participants are expected a full participation in all sessions and activities of the program. In general two sessions are held in the morning and another two in the afternoon. Sundays are free days.

II. For Application

Please submit the following items for your application. Deadline of submission of Application: 31 October 2010

1. Filled-up Personal Application Form – see attachment.
2. Letter of recommendation from your Provincial Superior or Leader.
3. Two recent passport photos.
4. A Xerox (Photo copy) copy of your passport – only the page where personal data is given.
5. A Medical Recommendation Form to be filled up and signed by your attending physician after your general check up.
6. A one page paper describing your spiritual religious missionary life journey as an SVD or as an SSpS.

(Applicants who are pressured to take this program are advised to wait until you are ready to enter into a renewal journey – freely and wholeheartedly.)

Take this opportunity given to you as a time for yourself, for personal renewal away from the day to day pastoral commitments and responsibilities. As our Constitutions 519 state: *“The tertiate is intended as a period for reflection, deepening one's religious life, strengthening one's missionary vocation and ongoing education... It strengthens the family spirit of our international community and is also a time for relaxation.”*

Liturgy Corner

Liturgy of the Word

Continuation of the meaning of the Liturgy of the word...

First Reading: Old Testament

From the earliest days, the church has believed in the continuity between the Old and New Testaments. Both focus on the Kingdom of God – Reign of God active in the world which will be realized in all its perfection at the end of time. This and other Old Testament themes, such as creation, salvation, prophecy, law, wisdom, etc., are all recapitulated in the person of Jesus, and help to form the presentation of Jesus, his person, life and ministry, by the New Testament writers. So close is the connection between the Old and New Testaments that Christians cannot fully understand the New Testament presentation of Jesus unless they reflect on the Old (Heb 1:1-3). For this reason it is an essential component of the liturgy of the word.

Responsorial Psalm or Gradual

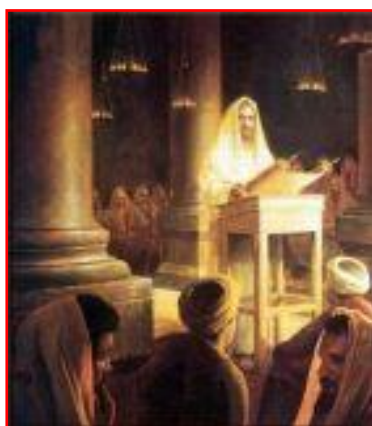
The responsorial psalm or gradual comes after the first reading and provides a peaceful and meditative response to God's word. In the synagogue at the time of Jesus, the Jews followed the readings of Scripture with the singing of psalms. Christians borrowed this practice and continue it to the present day in the form of the responsorial psalm.

Second Reading

This reading often called "the epistle" because it sometimes is part of a letter written to the early Christian communities or to individual persons to strengthen their faith, to instruct, to guide, to admonish, or correct errors. The second reading performs a similar function today. While addressed originally to a particular situation in the early church communities, the message of these writings transcends the centuries to motivate contemporary Christians and to deepen their appreciation of the mystery of Christ.
