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Novitiate and Religious Formation By: Frank Quainoo

The Novitiate is a stage or step in formation that distinguishes the religious (priest) from the Diocesan priest. It is a stage approved by the church for all who are going through religious formation. This stage has a span of one or two years depending on the religious congregation; it is appropriately called a canonical year.

This year is always preceded by postulancy, where the aspirant goes through observation and the candidate also, taking the opportunity to familiarise himself/ herself with some of the common activities of the congregation. It is only after one has successfully satisfies this condition, then he/she can be recommended to the novitiate upon his application; in order to eschew coercion. The novitiate, ideally speaking provides a conducive and congenial ambience for the novice who is preparing to become a member to discern well his vocation through prayer, reflection and guidance by the Director(s). are organized to assist the novice in his/her discernment process. This will include the Constitutions, which regulates the Society so that he/she acquaints him/herself with the needs and demands, the mission of the congregation, its spirituality, its founder(s), among others.

This level is free from academic works to some extent. It's an opportune time for the novice to build up an intimate relationship with God and have his own experience of who God is; to read as many spiritual books as possible to resource him/herself for the work ahead; read Bible commentaries and other materials to embellish his/her Bible knowledge.

Last but not the least, an in depth explanation of the evangelical councils- chastity, poverty and obedience; and how they are lived in the society is placed at the doorstep of the novice. This is to help him or her to make an informed and matured decision at the end of the novitiate.

For me, the novitiate is a stage, which well embraced adds value to one's religious calling and broadens his/ her perspective of religious life.

STAYING IN THE NOVITIATE FOR LESS THAN TWO MONTHS : MY EXPERIRNCE

On 27^{th} of September 2011, Gabriel Msimuko, a former novice from Zambia voluntarily opted out of the novitiate to join the Diocese in Zambia. Before he left, the Editorial Board asked him to share his experience with us. We bring you an excerpt.

I want to share my experience in my novitiate (SVD Novitiate Ghana). I spent only one month and some weeks and then decided to quit.

Novitiate is a lovely place that someone who wants to be religious can be. My first month was like hell on earth for me. I felt out of place despite the support and love given. I begun to ask myself is it everyone who is struggling like me? I asked some. However, they had their own stories to tell. I was always trying to prove the rightness of the novice master's comment that the novitiate is the best place a religious can be and others have said that too. For me it was not true.

The novitiate is a place of prayer so I increased my time of prayer and tried to reflect a lot. Then what was coming was that I was at the wrong place, I was not to become a religious. This led me to share with the novice master, I shared all I had gone through and why I think I am at the wrong place. Time was given for prayer and I made a decision to quit. After communicating my decision to stop to the novice master I had peace and everything started making sense. I had a week to stay before going back to Zambia. This was a lovely week; I enjoyed and saw why the novitiate is a good place to be. Those who feel that they are called to be religious have to use their time very well in the novitiate and indeed they will find out that truly the novitiate is a lovely place to be. Sad that I left, but it is always good to do the right thing and not bring distraction. Thanks to the novice masters and the novices for the support, guidance and care I received.

As part of the forth-coming 25th anniversary of the Divine Word Novitiate in September 2012, the Editorial Board of the Divine Word Novitiate (EB) interviewed Most Rev. Frank Nubuasah, SVD, (BFN) the Bishop of Francistown, Botswana. He is the first SVD Ghanaian Novice Director.

ED: My Lord, who is Bishop Frank Nubuasah?

BFN: I am a Divine Word Missionary. I was born on June 1949 at Likpe- Agbosome in the Volta Region of Ghana to Mr. Joseph Nubuasah and Mrs. Dorah Nubuasah all of blessed memory. We were eight in the family, four boys and four girls but one died. I am the fourth child of my parents but the first boy in the family. They are all married, except one of my sisters, Sr. Augusta Nubuasah, who is a religious sister of the Divine Handmaid of the Redeemer(HDR) working in Ghana. I had my elementary school at Likpe- Agbosome and secondary education at Kadjebi. I was ordained as Divine Word missionary priest in 1980.

EB: Your Grace, what motivated you to become a religious priest?

BFN: (He smiled) My desire to become a priest goes back to my youth. After my secondary School, I visited my cousin who was working in Accra at the Catholic Printing Press managed by the SVD. That was the first time I came into contact with the SVD. Four Rev. Brothers were working in the Catholic Press; two of them were young Ghanaian SVD Brothers. I was so impressed with the joy and fulfillment, which they expressed in their vocation and work. I asked my cousin who the Bothers were. He told me what he knew of the SVD and gave me the name and address of the Vocation Director. The next day, I visited the vocation director with my application letter to become an SVD to share the joy and inner peace I experienced in the young Brothers I met at the Catholic Press. I was admitted to begin my formation.

EB: Your Grace kindly tell us about your formation background.

BFN: I attended St. Victor's Major Seminary, Tamale in Ghana from 1973 to 1980 where I did both my philosophy and theology there. From 1975 to 1976, I did my novitiate. On 26th July 1980, I was ordained as a Divine world religious missionary priest.

EB: My Lord, after your ordination where did you work and which ministry?

BFN: After my ordination, I was appointed to work in Botswana in the southern part of Africa as one of the initial group of four SVD missionaries to start working in the country. I learned Setswana the national language and was posted to Maun where I worked for 8 years. While in Maun, my main task was primary evangelization of introducing Jesus to the people and people to Jesus. I was to help establish the Church in Maun and its surrounding villages and towns. In 1988, I was recalled to Ghana to assist in the formation of novices.

EB: How is your missionary life experiences in Botswana? Any Challenges and joys as a Ghanaian and SVD bishop there.

BFN: Looking back, I have enjoyed being a priest and will not think of being anything else. There is so much challenge and fulfillment in the life of the priest that the many frustrations that come with the ministry pale into nothingness. In Botswana, many people are hearing of Christ for the first time and old people becoming Christians after they follow their children to meet Christ. In addition to that, I spend an immense amount of time engaged and committed to dealing with issues related to AIDS, orphans and refugees and I believe that the Church faces many challenges as a result of this pandemic and which I must work to overcome the stigma and discrimination caused by the illness.

EB: My Lord you were once the Novice Director here in the Novitiate, what year was that?

BFN: Before my appointment as the Novice Director, I went for studies for two years. When I returned home, I was appointed as the director of the novices from 1992 until I was appointed Bishop of the Apostolic Vicariate of Francistown in 1998.

EB: Your Grace, as the Director of the Novices, what were some of the challenges you experienced? BFN: My main task as the director was to introduce young men to the life and vision of the Society of the

young men to the life and vision of the Society of the Divine Word. Another challenge was feeding the novices; it was not easy task feeding the novices to be energetic. Continued on page 8

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What we do in the Novitiate By: Stephen Osei Asante

Religious life begins with the novitiate year. It is a period of training and preparation that a novice or the prospective member of a religious order or congregation undergoes before committing oneself to the life of vows, in order to discern whether they are called to the religious life or not. In other words, it is the threshold between secular life and vows. "The novitiate begins on the day when the novice is officially accepted in to the community in with a private simple ceremony" (SVD Constitutions 512.4)

"To be valid the novitiate must be spent in a house duly designated for the purpose." (SVD Constitutions 512.3) We are located at Nkwatia - Kwahu in the Eastern Region, in the Catholic Diocese of Koforidua, Ghana. The novice master directs the novitiate; however, the provincial superior with the consent of his council can appoint one or two assistants. (SVD Constitutions 512.5) In the novitiate here, the Director of Novice is Fr. George Angmor, SVD, and assisted by Fr. Rafael Mesi, SVD. The novices may spend one or more periods of time away from the novitiate home to engage in activities, which fall in the scope of our Society (SVD Constitutions 512.6).

Our program lasts for at least twelve full calendar months, but not more than two years. In the Ghana Province, it is for one year and during this one year, we have inputs, workshops, seminars given by experts in the various fields. A typical day of a novice could be divided into, *prayer*; *class/inputs, manual work* and *sports*. The activities we engage in the house include:

Prayer; *as the centre of our life*. This we do through our daily Eucharist Mass and community prayers; meditation on the Scriptures; spiritual reading and exercises; Bible sharing, faith sharing-New Testament way of Christian living. We do have Holy hour and Benediction every Saturday and Sunday respectively. In addition to that, we have perpetual adoration every last Saturday of the month. That is praying before the Blessed Sacrament throughout the night, by taking turns until Mass the following morning.

Retreat and Recollection: This helps us in our spiritual journey to know the will of God. It also helps us in our discernment to become a religious missionary priest/brother. We have these important retreats throughout our canonical year. Initial retreat- A retreat before our investiture.

Monthly Recollections- It is done at the end of every month.

30 Day Retreat Journey: This is the climax of the Novitiate. It is an intensive spiritual exercise to discern and / or renew our "commitments" to Christ. A short Retreat before Vows- This is a period of strengthening the "commitment" we will make to Christ.

Manual work: As religious to be, we work towards more self-reliance. We produce some of the food we eat; we store what we cannot eat and share what we have with others. In our farm, we cultivate maize, cassava, plantain, banana, sweet potatoes etc. Furthermore, we also have palm plantation, vegetable garden, orchards of different kinds of fruits. We also have some animals such as sheep, goats, rabbits and free range fowls. We do cook on Sundays, it is not a task; it is an art to learn and to develop. As a community, we also take personal initiatives to improve the life of our community. In our conferences, we study the History, Constitutions and Charism of the Society and Christian spirituality.

Personal reflection; psychological support; spiritual direction; fraternal correction are always at our disposal for self formation.

Sports: We exercise our bodies to make us strong. This we do every Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday. On Tuesdays and Fridays, we play football and Wednesdays, volleyball.

To conclude, the novitiate is one full calendar year. A novitiate is a year we are bound to inculcate within our minds and hearts the yearnings of Jesus Christ and establishes a well-grounded vocation to deepen our understanding of our divine vocation and our vocation to the society of the Divine Word.

It is stated that this period serves to mature and clarify a vocation. It provides a basic introduction to the following of Christ as outlined in the life and spirituality of the Society and in our Constitutions; thus it leads one to follow him in an ever-deeper way. Through a living union with the Divine Word and through life in community, a novice should come to understand himself more clearly and know our society better so that he may make a fundamental mature responsible decision about his vocation. (SVD Constitutions 512)

My First Mission Sunday Experience in Ghana By: Alex Omondi

The beauty of Mission Sunday always climaxes with a feeling of encouragement and appreciation in missionaries in their various missions. The papal message, though one, the reactions seem to diversify the extent in which the Word of God has gotten into the people and the urgency by which it is needed to be received by others. With the grace of God, I have been lucky to witness and compare two Mission Sunday experiences; from my home country Kenya and here in Ghana. To avoid talking of two different things as though they were one, I would rather prefer to introduce a new conception of Mission Sunday here and this would be in its "loose" and "strict sense".

Mission Sunday in its loose sense would imply a day observed by the Catholic Church every fourth Sunday of October, to enable her faithful to pray for missionaries and their mission all over the world and to conscientised as to their own roles as missionaries in whatever state of life they are. This is the Mission Sunday celebration in Kenya with a little improvisation from various vocation promotion teams seeking to make known their presence and search for "fresh blood" for their various missionary institutions. In this case, we can notice that very little is ever achieved to strengthen the "old blood", the already practicing solders of Christ.

However, if mission Sunday indeed do exist in its strictest sense, then my experience at the Ghanaian celebration would simply express this enthusiasm. Even without any labourious explanation on the essence of mission Sunday, the jubilation and appreciation I witnessed in the Christian community here was enough to energize a religious with new spirit and pedal him/her to seek more the kingdom of God. I realised for the first time in my life at St. Margaret Mary Parish at Dansoman, that dedication and service to the Divine Word is not merely a sacrifice but rather a grace to be treasured, nurtured, tamed and celebrated, not only by the lay Christian community but by one self. The "thank you" and "I pray for you" were a clear indication to me that God did not only call me but He also assured me of acceptance. If this was to be the case with all mission Sunday celebrations all over the world, then there would be no need to observe it every fourth Sunday of October since this one would suffice for all eternity!

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The third challenge was letting the Provincial Administration at the time to accept that the parents of the novices have a part to play. That is the parents to visit the novitiate to see what their sons are doing. Thanks now the parents visit you every year.

EB: My Lord, how many times have you visited the novitiate and whenever you visit this place what memories come to mind?

BFN: This is my second time; the first visit was in 1998. Many things have changed. There are new facilities, also the nice paintings of the building. The environment looks beautiful and the numbers of rooms has increased.

EB: My Lord, next year, the novitiate will be 25 years old, what message do you have for us and the formation personnel in Ghana and AFRAM as a whole?

BFN: My message to the novices is that the spirit of teamwork is very important in formation to grow as a community. Also, make good use of this period that has been given to you by the Society. Do not let it slip through your hands. You should encourage yourselves to be responsible in formation. The habit of reading should be part of you as this will broaden your horizon. For the formation personnel, I will say they should keep up the good work in forming our future generation.

EB: My Lord, we express our gratitude to you for granting us audience. BFN: You are welcome.

16th November 1987, Monsignor Pius Kpeglo was the first Diocesan priest who visited the new novitiate.

4th December 1987, Very Rev. Frs: Peter McHugh (From Generate and in Charge of Formation ;) Herman Wigtten (in Charge of Justice and Peace) together with Patrick Moroney and Vincent Owusu visited the Novitiate. Fr. Peter McHugh encouraged the then novices to be good and be personally committed to their future Society. On his part, Fr. Wigtten admonished them to reflect on their future missionary task in solidarity with the poor.
